Dear Parents,

Spring is here and summer is just around the corner, which mean preparations for another exciting and meaningful week of camp are well underway! We anticipate another amazing group of Awana students to be ministered to by our incredibly gifted and caring camp staff. Our goal at camp remains unchanged: to provide an oasis of peace in the midst of life's uncertainty - by introducing young people to the Prince of Peace and deepening their understanding of the God who created them and loves them. We plan and prepare so as to do this in an atmosphere that is safe, enjoyable, and spiritually edifying.

Puget Sound Strategic Ministries ("PSSM"), our parent organization, and your camp staff are dedicated to the spiritual teaching and training of children and youth. At camp, this teaching focuses on core values that enable them to make choices resulting in a positive impact on their life, as well as upon our communities and our world. Our hope and prayer is that all children and youth will come to know, love and serve the Lord Jesus Christ. PSSM was instituted by individuals who have answered God's call to continue a camp ministry whose values have remained unchanged over the past 40 plus years. Our intent is to provide a camp environment (including biblical based teaching, personnel and program format) that has ministered to thousands of youth, providing a life changing experience.

Pacific NW Camp continues to remain unique: exclusively for Awana youth. We strive to make it a safe place, both physically and emotionally. We are keenly aware that we will spend more time with your child in one week than they will spend all year in their club. We regularly review our safety protocols and procedures, modifying them if necessary. Your volunteer staff is carefully chosen. They must be recommended, screened, reference and background checked each year before serving. Most are current Awana leaders, including former campers. Some are pastors and AWANA missionaries. All our staff volunteers for this camp ministry must also complete mandatory training and written testing prior to serving. Our goal is that each volunteer will have a positive spiritual impact on your child while at camp. Should you have any concerns regarding anything about camp, you are encouraged to contact either of the individuals below.

Discuss this camp with your son or daughter. Invite them to talk to you about their camp expectations, experiences, and/or concerns. And please -- let your son or daughter know they are encouraged to talk with any of our camp staff should there be something he or she is not comfortable with at camp.

Camp will be fun! But beyond that, we desire and envision camp to be a positive experience for you and your children; a time of spiritual growth, and a time your children look back on with fond memories, knowing they were cared for. Please read the <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> pages included with this application for additional helpful information. While registration can be accepted anytime prior to camp, please note <u>the camp deposit alone only secures a spot at camp until midnight June 30th</u> (see <u>Camp FAQ's</u>). We covet your prayers as we work to bring spiritual enrichment to the young people entrusted to us at camp.




What to Bring:

□Sleeping Bag and Pillow
☐ At least 7 sets of clothing (must adhere to the Camp Dress & Behavior Code). Pack
for Washington type weather (layers are good - include warm jacket).
□Don't forget clothing for the camp theme: "Cultivate Your Character in Christ"
□Extra t-shirts in your team color (color team notification will be made about a week before camp)
□Personal Toiletries: Towels, washcloth, soap, deodorant, shampoo, comb/brush,
toothbrush, toothpaste, etc.
□A Water bottle labeled with camper's first/last name name on it
□Insect repellent – sunscreen – chap stick - any other personal items
□Shoes – ATHLETIC SHOES (closed toe; no cleats) MUST BE WORN AT ALL
ACTIVITIES – NO BARE FEET AT ANY time other than in lake and shower -

Our High School ministry is designed to provide you an opportunity for your spiritual growth, and we look forward to serving in this capacity with you. In order to be ready for this, please consider the following.

As always, your prayers for the ministry and particularly for Thursday are most important. We trust there will be new opportunities to minister during this summer. Pray specifically for God's preparation in the hearts of the people He sends us. You will be going as God's ambassador (2Cor5:20) - a minister of the gospel of God's saving grace in both word and action - so ask Him



to prepare your heart! Pray that God will give you a vision and compassion for the lost and the hopeless. Pray also for travel safety and the good weather. There will be a fun activity following the ministry outreach part of the day.

Three more things: 1) <u>Citation Award recipients</u>, please <u>bring your plaque to camp</u> so we can recognize you and your SIGNIFICANT accomplishment. You will want to wear dress clothes to wear for the presentation. 2) Everyone, please arrange to bring a "generic" (no pictures or writing) colored tee shirt to wear on the ministry trip. We are really looking forward to serving you and serving with you! 3) If you participated in a missions trip (or creative outreach to your community) during the past year and would like to share what God is doing around the world, please let us know and come prepared with several pictures and a rough draft of what you would like to share. We can not guarantee that everyone will get the opportunity to present their trip in front of the entire camp, but we always want to hear in cabins and possibly, Bible Class.



Finally, All campers <u>having the desire</u> to help with the Praise and Worship portion of chapel will be working under the direction of the worship director. If you sing or play a musical instrument and have a desire to try-out for the worship team <u>please indicate this on your camp registration</u> and bring your instrument to camp. We are looking forward to a great praise and worship time at camp. Here is your opportunity to use your gifts/talents to bring honor and glory to the Lord.

Note: Mayfield Lake Youth Camp nor Pacific Northwest Camp will be responsible for instruments that are damaged, broken, lost, or stolen.

PNW Camp Dress and Behavior Code

1 Corinthians 6:19-20 "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body."

We believe a camp environment that is free from distractions is highly desirable so we may focus on what is spiritually and physically healthy. We want to avoid anyone damaging their testimony and offending or being a stumbling block to others. Therefore, we are all expected to **dress and act** in a Godly manner reflecting the principles and commandments of the Scripture. Modesty, cleanliness, and appropriateness, as well as safety and courtesy, are the standards applying to **campers and staff** alike. This includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- 1. Romantic displays/activities are out of place at camp. This includes any affectionate touch, cuddling, and/or pairing off with one particular member of the opposite gender (unless married!).
- 2. Homosexual or transgender conduct, defined as acts or identifying statements (including the use of pronouns that are inconsistent with a camper's/volunteer's biological gender), is incompatible with participation at PNWC and is a basis for dismissal. All campers/volunteers however, must be treated with dignity and respect, free of threats or harassment.
- 3. Chapel and Bible class: Out of respect and courtesy to everyone, especially our speakers/teachers, plan any trips to the restroom before the chapel service/Bible class has started. Make sure to use listening ears while in teaching times, so as not to be a distraction to those around you. Additionally, hats, sunglasses, and swimwear are inappropriate during Bible Class and during chapel times (worship/message).
- 4. In the Dining Hall, conversational tones and appropriate table manners are expected.
- 5. Be considerate and use quiet voices if outside after noise curfew (10pm).
- 6. During Game time having good sportsmanship, (i.e. cheering on one another and other teams), is highly encouraged and will help all campers to have enjoyable experience.

Dress Code for STAFF and CAMPERS includes:

- 1. **Undergarments**: not visible (they are called "undergarments" for a reason).
- 2. **Body piercings**: preferably, removed or not visible (except for modest earrings on females). Note: for those with other piercings, clear earrings are available at stores.
- 3. Shorts: Must reach to no less than mid-thigh of the wearer
- 4. **Leggings** are acceptable provided a shirt is worn that COMPLETELY covers the buttocks; **other tight, form fitting,** shorts or apparel is acceptable only if covered by approved camp apparel.
- 5. **Skirts and dresses** should be knee length or longer.
- 6. **All clothing** must cover the waist and midriff during any activity, and for females, the cleavage. No excessive or inappropriately sagging pants/shorts.
- 7. **Tank top/sleeveless arm shirts:** modest and completely cover any undergarments/straps.
- 8. **Footwear: Closed toe** (athletic shoes; no cleats) are mandatory for ANY activity time. **Footwear** is required at all times except in the shower, cabins, and while swimming.
- 9. Swimwear:

Females: Modest, one-piece or tankini suits must cover cleavage, bust, and midriff areas. Thong, g-string, high French-cut styles, or two-piece bikini type suits are <u>not</u> acceptable (even if worn under a T-shirt).

Males: Boxer style/board shorts w/liner or underwear are acceptable.

Both: T-shirts shall be worn over suits walking to/from swim area

No thanks! Please leave these at home: halter-tops, spaghetti straps, open back shirts, or tight "muscle" type shirts, clothing not in accordance with biological gender as determined by anatomy at birth and not subject to change, **OR** which exhibits alcohol, drug, tobacco products, satanic symbols, inappropriate language, or other inappropriate displays are prohibited.

Anyone who notices distractions such as those listed above should report it to the appropriate Camp Adviser or Camp Director only. **Cabin counselors are responsible** for monitoring and privately addressing their assigned campers. In all cases, the Camp Adviser's corrective instruction (or in their absence, the Camp Director) shall be final.

If you want your camper to get mail and you do not wish to pay postage on, you must pre-arrange this with your camper's cabin counselor and drop it off when you drop off your camper. If you want the mail delivered on a certain day please mark the day on the package. Otherwise, please read the Information For Family (and friends) for specifics about mail call, mailing instructions, and visitors at camp.



CAMP F.A.Q.'s

- > Where is Pacific Northwest Camp? We are hosted by Mayfield Lake Youth Camp, near Mossyrock, WA
- What happened to Puget Sound Camp? We have merged with our sister camp, and simply changed our name.
- What is the age/grade requirement for camp? JH/Middle school campers must be upcoming 6th graders and at least 10 years of age by the first day of camp. HS grade campers must be 13 years old by the first day of camp.
- ➤ What other requirements do I need to complete (and by when) to come to camp? Completion of any 3-12th grade Awana book/manual for first time camp attendance. Completion of the Awana handbook/manual for the current (2024-2025) club year is required for returning campers in order to motivate campers to study God's Word diligently (2 Timothy 2:15).
- When is it too late to register and/or pay? It's never too late. However, to lock in the lowest rate of \$450, a registration MUST be made by midnight, May 30th, 2025. May 1st through midnight June 30th the cost increases to \$475. July 1st the cost increases to \$500 and a team shirt in camper size cannot be guaranteed.
- Are there any discounts to the registration fees? Yes, discounts for multiple children from the same family and for those serving in full time ministry can be found on the online application or by contacting the registrar.
- > What options to I have for registration and payment? Both online registration and online credit card payment (including installment payments) are available in addition to previous methods of payment (mail, money grams, checks, etc.).
- How and when will I receive confirmation of my registration? Camper confirmation information and instructions is an automated response from our online registration vendor (Cvent) once your registration is completed.
- > Who do I make any "offline" registration payments/fees to? "PSSM Pacific NW Camp"
- > Who do I MAIL my application or checks to? Pacific NW Camp Registrar, PO Box 301, Burley, WA 98322
- Who do I contact for registration or payment related questions? Registrar: psecampreg@gmail.com
- What is the pre-registration date for? The non-refundable \$75pre-registration application fee/date is there for three reasons. First, it secures a spot at camp in the event the camp fills up. Second, it helps us to know how many volunteer staff we're going to need. Since these volunteers give up vacations, etc. to serve at camp, it's helpful for them to know if they're needed. Third, there are up-front costs (printing, shirt & award purchases, etc.) that require payment well before camp starts. Early registration fees are used for those purposes.
- ➤ How does the roommate preference request work? You and your roommate preference must request each other. Campers must be in the same grade. Roommate request cannot be assured; we'll do our best, but we cannot guarantee it. If we can't accommodate a roommate preference, we will try to pair them on the same team.
- > Can I preference a team color or counselor on my application? No. We do not accept preferences for team colors or counselors for a variety of reasons.
- ➤ Will there be pictures or videos available from camp? Yes. We make arrangements to take a lot of pictures and video during the week. Campers can expect to receive a USB drive at the end of camp that includes these. Some examples can be viewed on our Facebook page and/or at www.pugetsoundcamp.org or https://pacificnwcamp.org/

- Can I raise money or solicit scholarships to attend camp? Yes! For nearly 25 years, this camp included the word "scholarship" in its title. The idea behind that is the camper has *earned* their admittance to camp by completing the requirements. So families, churches, and clubs are encouraged to sponsor or scholarship them (partially or fully) for their achievement. Many already do this. Other clubs hold fundraisers for their campers to help offset the cost of camp. See the "Fundraiser Ideas" attachment or on the camp website. The possibilities are endless and too many to list here, but it will take initiative on the part of the camper, family, club, and/or church. Some campers actually earn their own money specifically to attend camp by working odd jobs or offering services to those in their family or church. Limited scholarships are also available through PNWCamp and PSSM Puget Sound Strategic Ministries). Contact a PNWCamp director via email and/or PSSM at pssmnw@gmail.com
- ➤ I have a summer conflict. Can I arrive late to or leave early from camp? Yes, with permission from and coordination with the camp director. Although this is strongly discouraged for a number of different reasons, we realize there are unique circumstances that can make arriving on schedule unavoidable. We do not, however, pro-rate the fees accordingly, and arriving more than 24hrs late is generally discouraged. Leaving early is discouraged for many of the same reasons, and we are reluctant to allow this any earlier than the last evening of camp (Friday). Late arrivals should plan to check in at the Medical Station. If unattended, please ask any camp staff member to immediately notify the camp director or medical staff for camper in-processing. Early departures must be coordinated with both their cabin counselor and camp director by email, or phone (360-281-8702).
- I have a conflict with the camp dates and cannot attend. Are there other camp options? We are sorry that you can't attend Pacific Northwest Camp this year! Inland Northwest Camp is very similar to ours and also staffed by Awana leaders that love the Lord and love your kids, just like our staff! Please contact us for more information if you need it. Or, once we have a link for their camp we will put in on our website and update it here.
- Can my camper call home? No, not normally. You can imagine what it would be like if we allowed 150+ teenagers to keep their cell phones with them during the week of camp. In order to keep camp free of distractions and to minimize the chance for lost, damaged, or stolen phones, they are not permitted at camp (unless left off/locked in the camper's vehicle). Of course, making/receiving phone calls is allowed if there is a camper/family emergency. In case of emergency, text or call the camp director (360-281-8702) for communication arrangements.
- > Will I get to talk to my child during the week? We strongly encourage sending mail, but we discourage phone calls in order to keep the camp free of distractions so we can maximize the Lord's ministry to your child at camp. Unless there is a family emergency, please refrain from contacting your child by phone. Instructions and the address for mailing your child are included in the information you will be sent upon registration.
- > Can my child write home/church from camp? Please do! Especially to thank those who may have helped sponsor them to camp. However, they will need to bring stamps/cards/envelopes.
- What is the camp theme? Cultivate Your Character In Christ (Hosea 10:12) The theme is carried out in both activities and decorations. We encourage staff/campers to decorate their cabins to the theme. We also encourage them to bring some fun, appropriate clothing to celebrate the theme. On Friday evening, all the camp is encouraged to dress for dinner in their theme attire (farm or western styles) OR in nice, casual clothing. Our theme for each year can be found on our Facebook page and website, and in other registration documents.
- What is the High School ministry outing? During the week, HS students are teamed up and receive training in various evangelistic tools for outreach ministry (puppets, face painting, etc.). On Thursday, the students are bused in teams to different nearby locations (parks, nursing homes, etc.) where they may conduct supervised outreach ministry. The locations, planning, and logistics are all coordinated and approved well in advance of camp by our HS ministry coordinators. After the ministry completion, they spend time in fellowship and recreation, returning to camp for their cabin devotions and bed. Once registered, an informational letter is included as part of the HS camper's welcome information email package.

- > My child is a little timid and may get homesick. Should I be concerned? Not at all. After many years of camp ministry, we are well acquainted with this and it comes as no surprise. We realize this is the first camp experience for many of the children. Our staff does receive training on dealing with homesickness; but more important, we strive to provide an atmosphere of genuine care. We also enlist our older (HS) campers and pair them up as mentors to new campers (see the camp application). This has proven a successful approach at helping many children adjust to the camp experience who are a little timid, get homesick, or are just new to the camp experience. Many of them chose to serve as mentors themselves when they reach HS.
- > Is there someone to help my child if they get hurt or sick? We always plan to have at least one registered nurse and one EMT on site at camp and all staff receive basic instructional training in the event of an emergency. Our host camp also has a medical team available for our use if needed. Be assured we will contact you if we believe your child should visit a doctor or hospital.
- > Can I start helping my child memorize the verses for camp? Please do! They will be available with your registration or can be found on our Facebook page.
- What kind of clothes and bedding will they need to bring? Our activities keep your child very busy, so pack clothes appropriate for outdoor activity in NW WA. Details are given upon your registration on the "What to Bring/Leave behind" page as well as our Clothing and Behavior Code. Extra shirts in their team color are recommended but not required (team colors will be assigned and emailed one week prior to camp). Each camper will need to bring their own pillow and bedding. Twin mattresses are provided. A sleeping bag works well.
- > How does the camp address food allergies or special dietary needs? In general, we will strive to be peanut free, serving buffet style meals with a salad option and limited selections of certain dietary needs. However, we will accommodate those who wish to bring special foods with them and keep them refrigerated or frozen. Please feel free to contact us with any questions or concerns you might have regarding our food service. If your child has severe food allergies (e.g. nuts) they must also be noted in their registration medical information in order for us to take preventative measures within their cabin, etc.
- When time should my child arrive at camp? If your child is a new camper, please view the new camper orientation online and plan to have them arrive between 3-3:30pm. If your child is returning to camp, please plan to have them at camp no later than 3:45pm so they have time to complete the check-in process and get their belongings to their room before. Camp starts at 4:30pm.
- What time should I pick up my child from camp? You should plan to arrive at camp between 10-1030am. Your child will be in the chapel until around 10am, then will be dismissed to their cabins or field area next to Dining Hall. Once you have located your child, they can direct you to their belongings. Camp must be vacated by 11am.

INFORMATION FOR FAMILY (and friends):

Part of the fun we have at camp is "Mail Call". This is a time where we have fun passing out mail to the campers. Most mail received is passed out at this time, but we prioritize packages, postcards, or letters of 3 or more for the same individual for this special time. Plan ahead!! Options:

A) If you send your mail to camp (via USPS, UPS, FedEX):

It is important your mail arrives by Thursday to be distributed at Friday final "mail call". Campers (and occasionally staff) "earn" their mail, usually with some fun competition or silly action they get to perform for the group. Our activity team conducts this event and it's designed for lots of clean fun and laughter.

B) If you hand deliver to camp (no postage) it can be dropped in designated totes outside the dining hall and should have the campers name and cabin number on it.

Note!: <u>all sent mail MUST have a return address</u> or late arriving mail cannot be returned or forwarded. Campers wishing to *send* mail must bring envelope & stamps to camp. <u>Mail delivery the last day of camp (Saturday) is AFTER we are required to vacate camp!!</u>

CAMP VISITORS

Pacific NW Camp understands that occasionally there are those who desire to visit camp while it is in progress. However, recognizing that visitors to camp can disrupt the ministry of both our camp staff and the Holy Spirit, visitation is discouraged between camp check-in and check-out, with the exception of the Citation Award Ceremony on Friday evening. Also, with the exception of camper's parents or legal guardian, visitors to camp shall be allowed by invitation only, and only with the consent of the camp director. Any visit should be arranged prior to camp.

<u>All visitors</u> are required to check in and out at the camp medical station where they will be signed in receive an special camp ID button. Any visitor must remain under escort of Pacific NW Camp staff. <u>Siblings of campers</u> may accompany parents/guardians as long as both remain together. Non-parental visits shall normally be restricted to ministry related activities. ID buttons must be returned when signing out.
